*Financial Challenges: Exploring Alternative Solutions* - The reality of our parish facing financial challenges should not dampen our spirits. It is an opportunity for us to think outside the box and find creative solutions. This calls for an exploration of other avenues, such as fundraising, to generate additional income for our parish projects.

#### **New Parish Pastoral Committee**

The new Parish Pastoral Committee (PPC) was established at the beginning of May, following two rounds of open parish voting. The members duly elected to the PPC are Andrew Bell, Philip Borthwick, Ian Campbell, Donal Hannon and Kevin Pugh. Donal Hannon was elected as Chairperson. Ex officio members of the PPC are Fr. Jay and the Parish Treasurer (Stephen Smith). The Chairperson of the PPC also becomes an ex officio member of the Parish Finance Committee.

The PPC will be instrumental in taking forward not only the forthcoming Parish Stewardship Programme but also to lead on and oversee the various projects (both Alive in Faith, as well as general property maintenance) previously undertaken by the Fabric Committee, whose functions are now absorbed by the new PPC.

However, it is also intended that the PPC's role should equally have a focus on the wider parish pastoral concerns and help to facilitate both the spiritual as well as the communal and social needs of the parish. To this end a number of parish teams under the auspices of the PPC are being established to address and manage these areas of concern in the parish and to take the initiative for its growth. The areas of concern have initially been identified as follows and will be refined further as they take shape over the coming months:

- Youth
- Alive in Faith Projects
- Parish Stewardship Programme
- Liturgy & Music

- Parish Activities
- Parish Social Outreach.

The Programme is scheduled to begin on the weekend of 23<sup>rd</sup>-24<sup>th</sup> September.
