

GOSPEL REFLECTION FOR THE EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



Give them food yourselves

We've heard of the miracle of the Feeding of the Five Thousand from childhood and it's a brilliant story, but what is the real point of it. Is the point of it to prove Jesus' divinity and God's great power? Is it to show Jesus' compassion in caring for people even when he was at his most tired? Perhaps the point of the story is Jesus' response in solving the problem of the crowd's hunger. Significantly, Jesus turns to the disciples and says, "Give them food yourselves...." How must the disciples have felt? They were used to Jesus taking charge. How did he expect them to solve a problem of this enormity? But to Jesus there is no problem. He takes what little the disciples have, five loaves and two fishes, sanctifies it and the results are enough to feed five thousand with food left over.

Today the world is asking to be fed both literally and spiritually. Could the little we have to offer be enough to tackle problems of a global size? Back in 2000, all the nations of the world agreed to what are called the Millennium Development Goals, initially set for 2015 and now projected until 2030. It is possible for us to eradicate poverty. We have the will and we are already well underway. As in the feeding of the five thousand, God is asking us to do our bit and he will use whatever small steps we take in ways that might surprise us.

From our human perspective, we look at the planet's resources and see scarcity. From God's perspective there is great abundance. Now it's up to us to share our God given resources justly around the world.

Feast of the Transfiguration. 6th August: 'Having A Vision' - Having a vision is important. If we set out on our holidays with neither a destination nor a map we will get precisely nowhere! Similarly having a vision is important in life, firstly in giving us something to aim for and secondly to keep us motivated when we get side-tracked. As Christ's disciples we might motivate ourselves with a vision of a world without hunger, poverty or war ... or simply to improve the life of one other person. The Feast of the Transfiguration invites us

to stay motivated as disciples in the belief that we will one day enjoy the place God has prepared for each of us.

Hiroshima & Nagasaki Anniversary, 6th-9th August - On August 5th 1945, Hiroshima became the first city in the world to suffer a nuclear attack. On August 9th Nagasaki became the second city to be hit by an atomic bomb. The Japanese cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki commemorate the bombings every year. Use the anniversaries as a focus for prayer reflection and action on behalf of peace and nuclear disarmament. *"To remember the past is to commit oneself to the future. To remember Hiroshima is to abhor nuclear war. To remember Hiroshima is to commit oneself to peace."* (Pope John Paul II, Hiroshima, Japan, 1991.)
