LENT 2013

Yes, Lent isn't far away, and next Sunday the usual Lent Paper will be available, setting out our various Lenten activities. We are hoping to have the traditional Lent Lunches at the Presbytery on Fridays, and soon a Rota will be appearing on the notice board, asking for volunteers for making the soup. I remember being anxious last year as to whether all of the spaces on the Rota would be filled ; please be thinking about this – it isn't a huge job, as usually there are not more than a dozen people to be catered for. Only once in my eleven years here, I think, has a man volunteered! – maybe this year one or two more chefs will emerge?

Parishes have been encouraged during this Year of Faith to study and discuss one or other of the documents from the Second Vatican Council, since the Year of Faith is being kept partly in celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the opening of the Council. As I mentioned a week or so ago, we have elected here to study the important document on the nature and purpose of the Church, *LUMEN GENTIUM* (Light of the Peoples). Meetings will be held for this purpose on the Tuesday evenings during Lent, 7.30pm-8.30pm. I think that this will be an interesting and useful exercise. The document is not impossibly difficult and technical – all of us, I think, will find it thoroughly comprehensible and illuminating. I've obtained copies of it, and if you would like one, they are available in the Sacristy priced at £4.0. Some of you, of course, may have the Documents of Vatican II in book form, and will be able to use that.

WE ARE THE BODY OF CHRIST

When we come to study *LUMEN GENTIUM* together, we will be reminded of St.Paul's great image of the Church as a human body. This, you remember, formed the Second Reading at Mass last Sunday, and afterwards I rather wished that I'd said something about it in the homily. I wondered whether some people – dare I say it – were wondering just what St.Paul was going on about, his treatment of the subject being rather long and convoluted. But of course it is a great and inspiring picture of the Church, the Pilgrim People of God, which St.Paul paints.

Essentially, he is saying that just as the human body is made up of many different parts, which all function together, and are interdependent, so the Church of God is made up of innumerable people – of everyone who has been joined to Our Lord Jesus Christ through baptism. We too - all who are 'in Christ', as St.Paul says elsewhere - are part of this 'body' which is The Church. Each one of us derives life, eternal life. from the risen Christ. And each one of us relates within this 'body' not just to Christ the 'head', but to each other. Each of us – like the many many parts of the human body – has a part to play, and the Body of Christ is not complete without us. We are indeed 'inter-dependant' : no one person is unimportant, irrelevant, or unnecessary.

St.Paul's image of the Church as a human body is as striking and instructive as Our Lord's image of the Church as a Vine, where every branch and leaf derives life from Christ the stem. These images help us appreciate saving truths.
