

Getting the Message Out

We live in a world of wolves! The Christian message grows quieter and quieter just when it needs to be strong. The Church is smaller just when the need around us is greater. How can we promote Jesus' message in a society that tries to confine Christianity to a Sunday afternoon TV Slot?

We might feel small in face of impacting our beliefs on an unbelieving world. That we feel small perhaps helps us to understand the task the early disciples faced in Luke's Gospel. The scene set in today's gospel must

have looked something like a biblical 'campaign trail'. Jesus sent seventy-two disciples ahead of him in pairs to every town and place he intended to visit to prepare the way. Jesus knew that they were up against the odds. He describes them as lambs among wolves. "The harvest is abundant," he says, "but the labourers are few." More credit then, to those early disciples that the Christian message has survived for over two thousand years. What can we learn from their obvious success?

Jesus gave his early disciples some important practical advice. His first words of advice were for us to travel light. How can we concentrate on impacting Jesus' will if we are burdened with other concerns? Next Jesus advocates relying on hospitality and walking away from opposition. Perhaps today we would call it 'knowing one's audience'. In a nutshell, Jesus is asking us to focus on the job in hand, avoid distraction, and not to be deterred by opposition or setbacks.

God's message needs 'selling' just as much now as it did two thousand years ago. The message of peace is ever more relevant in a divided world. The job to be done might seem impossible, but we take encouragement from those few early disciples and the scale of their obvious success.

Pope Francis's Prayer Intention for July 2016 - The indigenous peoples of the world pretty much just want what everyone else wants. Indigenous peoples want to enjoy their rights to the lands, territories, and resources that they have traditionally owned, occupied, or otherwise used. They want to participate as equals in an impartial and



transparent process for resolving the conflict in a fair and respectful way. They want to educate their children in their own languages, and about their own traditions; to worship in their own ways; to establish media in their languages; to retain their traditional modes of resolving internal disputes; and to fully participate in any outside decision-making that could have an impact on their lives. The indigenous peoples of the world have spent hundreds of years fighting for this. This month Pope Francis invites us to join in his prayer intention for July "....That indigenous peoples, whose identity and very existence are threatened, will be shown due respect."

Post EU Referendum Statement - Cardinal Nichols, Archbishop of Westminster and President of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales has released a statement after the EU Referendum saying that racism and hatred of others is "something we must not tolerate": He writes, "The great challenge for those leading the nation now is to speak for everyone.
