World Day for the Sick, 11th February - Pope Francis entitled his message for the 2017 celebration of the World Day of the Sick "Amazement at what God has accomplished: 'The Almighty has done great things for me...' (Lk 1:49)". In his world message for World Day of Prayer for the Sick, Pope Francis invited the sick, healthcare workers, and volunteers to turn to Mary in prayer. "...Like Saint Bernadette, we stand beneath the watchful gaze of Mary. The humble maiden of Lourdes tells us that the Virgin, whom she called "the Lovely Lady", looked at her as one person looks at another. Those simple words describe the fullness of a relationship. Bernadette, poor, illiterate and ill, felt that Mary was looking at her as a person. The Lovely Lady spoke to her with great respect and without condescension. This reminds us that every person is, and always remains, a human being, and is to be treated as such. The sick and the those who are disabled, even severely, have their own inalienable dignity and mission in life. They never become simply objects. If at times they appear merely passive, in reality that is never the case."

Pope Francis's Prayer Intention for 2017: Comfort for the Afflicted - We have grown to believe that those with a disability aren't looking for sympathy; that they are just looking for the same opportunities as everybody else. But that doesn't mean that we shouldn't extend them a helping hand. In particular, those living with a disability and have the misfortune to be a refugee or to be living in poverty, especially need our prayers and our support. This month we are asked to join in Pope Francis' prayer intention, ".... That all those who are afflicted, especially the poor, refugees, and marginalized, may find welcome and comfort in our communities."
