

GOSPEL REFLECTION FOR PALM SUNDAY



What's the Point?

Today we recall the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem and we hear again the story of the Passion. But as we stand in church waving our palms and reading our Mass books, we have to be aware that we are doing more than just re-reading a two thousand year old story. What point is there in simply remembering a sequence of events? There is only a point in remembering Jesus' Passion if it truly impacts on our twenty first century lives.

We don't need to have been around at the time to imagine how it must have felt to be a part of the crowd that greeted Jesus as he rode into Jerusalem. We know what it's like to be swept along with a crowd. We know how we can be brave as part of a crowd... infallible even. We remember the crowd that supported Jesus so enthusiastically at the beginning of the week and how it mysteriously melted away by the end, to be replaced by a different crowd shouting for his crucifixion. Are we any better than those original supporters? Can we stand up for Jesus as individuals when the going gets tough?

We remember Jesus' journey from Palm Sunday to Good Friday. We remember that it's a journey he made with no hint of compromise. How easy it would have been for Jesus to have bypassed Jerusalem altogether, but what would have been the point of that for us two thousand years on. There is no room in Christianity for compromise.

We remember the death of Jesus as a supreme act of love. Jesus taught that we were worth all that pain and suffering. Do we leave the church today simply to catch up with our Facebook accounts and enjoy our Sunday lunch, or do we consider how we should live our lives from this day on knowing that Jesus considered us worth his ultimate sacrifice?

East Africa Crisis Appeal - In the space of one week CAFOD supporters have raised an incredible £1 million for the East Africa Crisis Appeal, meaning that vital aid can reach the most vulnerable families. News from our Rome Correspondent: “On 15th March myself and two other East Anglia students, along with eight other members of the Beda community, were instituted as acolytes by Archbishop Bernard Longley of Birmingham; the archbishop had arrived at the college earlier that day in company with Bishop Terence Drainey of Middlesbrough and Bishop Michael Campbell of Lancaster for the annual visitation of the Beda by the episcopal conference of England and Wales. The occasion was made particularly special for us by the attendance of vicar general Fr David Bagstaff of East Anglia, representing Bishop Alan. The festive meal that followed, which event is always an opportunity for the kitchen staff to excel, was both memorable and a great testament to the generosity of the staff and student community, who work hard to emphasise to the new acolytes that they have indeed reached another important milestone in their formation for priesthood.

“The following morning I was out of bed just after 6am to serve the community mass as celebrated by Bishop Michael: thus I was first to have the opportunity to exercise the ministry of acolyte, and what a great privilege that was. In addition to serving at mass and acting as a minister of holy communion, acolytes at the Beda lead services of exposition of the Blessed Sacrament five evenings each week and also preside at Compline from the Divine Office, which prayer concludes the day here: this is good practice for what we all aspire to in working towards diaconal and priestly ordination. In the last week members of the community also assisted with the early morning Stations mass held at St Paul’s Basilica and celebrated by Cardinal Harvey, after which the congregation was invited back to the college for breakfast. Hospitality remains a high priority at the Beda, and friends and family who visit Rome are always welcome here.

“Please accept my prayers and good wishes for a blessed Eastertide. I will be back in the diocese in June, at which time I hope to see everyone and hear your own news; although I am delighted to be here, I do miss people and places, and very much look forward to my return. ~ Regards, Mike Brookes”
