THE CAFÉ COURSE

Last Tuesday evening we had another enjoyable session ; despite atrocious weather, there was no decline in the number of people attending! The subject was St.Francis of Assisi, and we all thought that the Presentation was excellent. We discovered that just as with the first two Saints, Francis came to a deep and courageous faith in God through a prolonged time of silent reflection : with Patrick, it was when he was forced to act as a shepherd when a captive in Ireland, with Benedict it was when he withdrew to the cave at Subiaco as a hermit, and with Francis it was when he was a prisoner of war at Perugia. One of the things we thought about was how WE, in our noisy, busy, lives, might make time for silent reflection. It needs, perhaps, to be an inner silence, in which we can encounter God and hear him speaking to us.

We rediscovered that two of the main things which St.Francis teaches us about are liberation and joy, and that these things are closely related to each other. Francis liberated himself by parting with all his possessions, even the rich clothes of which he stripped himself in the presence of the Bishop of Assisi. He found liberation in utter poverty, and a profound and abiding joy. Well of course all of us want to discover true joy – we want a happiness and a peace that is real and lasting. St.Francis challenges to find this in the same way that he did, by not accumulating possessions and supposing that they and the wealth they represent are the answer to our deepest desires and problems. His solution was radical, and was based on a profound and extravagant love of God. As a Franciscan sister said in the course of the Presentation, what the Christian is seeking to do is 'to fall in love more deeply with Jesus'. St.Francis showed us a way towards that, and no one could be a better model for what he was advocating than he himself!

We've now thought about three male saints in the Course, and it is high time that we learnt more about a female saint. So this coming Tuesday we turn our attention to St.Catherine of Sienna. I know virtually nothing about her. Do you? Let's meet up on Tuesday and discover her together!
