GOSPEL REFLECTION FOR THE SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT



Believing Jesus is the Son of God - Jesus is the Son of God, but there are those who have other opinions. Perhaps he was just a very good man with a gift for teaching and healing. Perhaps he was just a prophet. Perhaps he was just a charismatic leader, a social worker, a philanthropist, a rebel or some kind of religious genius.

Today Jesus takes Peter, James and John up a mountain to pray. And as Jesus was praying the appearance of his face is changed, and his clothes become a dazzling white. Suddenly they see two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They have appeared in

glory and are speaking of his departure, which he is to accomplish at Jerusalem.

What the Bible is saying here is that Jesus of Nazareth was no ordinary human being. Jesus was no ordinary carpenter from Galilee. Jesus was not just a miracle worker, not just a teacher, not just a healer. In the 'Transfiguration' Jesus reveals his true identity. Jesus is the Son of God, the only Son of God'. It's no wonder that Peter wants to erect three tents to hold onto this truth. How privileged the early disciples were to have been given this vision. We have not been given first-hand experience of the Transfiguration, but what we do have is the evidence of how the disciples' lives were changed by the Knowledge of Jesus' identity. The disciples had the memory of the Transfiguration to motivate them through the difficult times ahead. We have the memory of Peter's commitment and influence to motivate us similarly.

There are those who think it is good enough simply to believe Jesus was a good man. For those of us who believe Jesus is the Son of God, we will never attend the funeral of a loved one with thoughts of never seeing them again. Believing in God, means believing that one day we will share in Jesus' glory.

Pope Francis' Prayer Intention for March 2022 - When we study biology, we come close to God, the Creator of all living things. The miracle of life includes not only the fact that life

itself exists but the amazing truth that we, ourselves God's living creations, have been given the ability to understand life and cultivate it. We have the power to cure disease and alleviate suffering. We also have the freedom to abuse that power, using it for selfish ends or withholding it from others out of greed or malice. Lent Talks, BBC Radio 4, Wednesday at 20.45 - "I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink" Lent Talks is a series of personal reflections inspired by an aspect of the story leading up to Easter. This year's theme is the power of hospitality, based on Jesus' encouragement in Matthew's gospel to feed the hungry, welcome the stranger and look after the sick.

Saint Patrick, 17th March - St. Patrick reminds us that the first person the Lord saves us from is ourselves. Sometimes the decisions we make in life or the experiences that happen to us, through no fault of our own, can bring us to the edge of despair, just like St. Patrick experienced. But instead of turning inward, St. Patrick reminds us to turn to God who is waiting for us. "I was like some great stone, lying deep in the mud," he tells us, but God "in his mercy lifted me up" and "placed me on the very top of the wall" (*Confessio*).
