

GOSPEL REFLECTION FOR THE TWENTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Wisdom’s Banquet.



Wisdom and Folly are personified in the book of Proverbs. Each lay on a banquet and we are invited to choose which to attend. Those who share the bread and wine offered at Wisdom’s banquet will learn from the Lord and gain wisdom and life. Those who choose Folly’s banquet will learn nothing more than to live by one’s own thoughts and desires. The drama provides a backdrop for today’s gospel reading.

“Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him.”

Jesus is describing a spiritual diet in which we can achieve a union with him. We are what we consume. If we consume a diet of pulp fiction, junk television, consumer catalogues and gossip, our heads will end up full of trivia and poor priorities. If we consume a diet of thoughtful conversation, prayer selective reading and action based on faith we will be worthier people as a result. So too when we celebrate the Eucharist, we become what we consume. We become God’s people.

The invitation to eat Jesus’ flesh and drink his blood was too much for some of Jesus’ earliest disciples. They turned their backs and walked away. Today we are given the same choice. The banquet is set and the guests are invited. We can choose between Wisdom and Folly. We can accept the invitation to spiritual nourishment through the Eucharist, or we can find our sustenance elsewhere.

International Day for the Remembrance of the Slave Trade and its Abolition, 23rd August - Slavery Remembrance Day is important because it helps us to commemorate the lives and deaths of millions of enslaved Africans and their descendants

who were central to the rise of Britain as an industrial power. We are asked to remember that slavery is not something for the history books. Slavery still exists today. Modern day slaves are not free to come and go. Many are chained or kept in locked rooms. They are forced to work without pay and are deprived of basic human rights. They have been kidnapped, sold or tricked into a life of suffering and deprivation. Modern day slaves are bought and sold as ‘possessions’ and are often abused and mistreated by their ‘owners’.

How Is Your Marriage? - August is traditionally the month for weddings, but it's also a good time for us all to give our relationships a ‘spring clean’. Marriage Care UK tell us families are often physically together but they are not really focused or paying attention to each other. Research in recent years has shown that the average person can spend up to 8 hours and 41 minutes on electronic devices and that we spend more time with our phones than our partners!
