## THE SAVILE AFFAIR

I was never a fan of Jimmy Savile ; for one thing, I found his hair, accent, and manner distinctly off-putting. And I know that the crimes which he is alleged to have committed are of a most

serious and repulsive nature. But nevertheless I find myself wanting to protest against that total demonisation of him which is all too widespread at present. No one is wholly bad, wholly evil; all of us are a mixture of good and bad, in differing degrees. He undeniably helped people in need, and it is unrealistic to imagine that absolutely everything that he did was done from bad motives and with evil intent. It is proper that wrongdoing is denounced, and that crime is condemned. But not in such a way, and to such an extent, that all good is denied, and badness is magnified so as to make a person out to be totally evil. If that happens, justice itself is offended against, and charity is quite forgotten.

## THE CAFÉ COURSE

Well how did the first session, held last Tuesday, go? Was it a success? On one level, it was very disappointing. Just under thirty people attended, less than expected, and no one seemed to have succeeded in bringing any lapsed or enquiring people with them, although I know that some of you had tried. In terms of outreach – something we'd hoped for very much – it was a dismal failure.

And yet the fact remains that it was a most enjoyable evening. There was a very friendly, warm, atmosphere, and I think that those who did come, thoroughly enjoyed it. And we found, I think, that St. Patrick had much to teach us. Maybe he taught us about three C's. First COMMITMENT : he was wholly committed to the proclamation of the Gospel, as we must be. His heart was truly and utterly in it. He gave himself completely and utterly to the work. Maybe we are less than effective as evangelists because we are look-warm. Only when we are deeply convinced of God's truth will we be successful as transmitters of it.

The second C would be COURAGE. He was wonderfully courageous in returning to Ireland, where he had once been a captive – as indeed he was in standing up even to hostile kings in his proclamation. We, like him, live in an age which is hostile to the things of God. We have to be courageous and determined in our witness. And then the third C is CHARITY. He had a burning love for the people he wanted to bring to God, and we must have that love too. Without love, we won't succeed.
