


## GOSPEL REFLECTION FOR THE FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT



### Beware Fake Santas

The trouble with Advent is that Christmas comes at the end. We know that Advent is a time for taking stock, but with Christmas just around the corner, we're far too busy with shopping lists to think about the state of our souls.

It seems obvious that we should spend our lives in preparation for the final judgement day, but it is all too easy to take our eye off the ball. Life heaps demands on us day in and day out. We spend each and every day taking the children to school, going to work, cleaning the house, shopping, cooking, cleaning, fixing the car and paying the bills. At this time of year in particular it is easy to get swamped in the things that the TV ad's convince us we must do before Christmas. We end up feeling trapped and unable to see the bigger picture. All of a sudden it's too late. We never get to do the things we know we should have done.

The gospel paints a frightening picture of the end of the world, but it is not meant to terrify us. Rather, the signs of the second coming are there to liberate us. Advent is a time of waiting and of looking forward. We are looking forward not just to Christmas but to the second coming of Jesus. The signs of the second coming are there to liberate us from the material preparations of Christmas and all the other things that weigh us down. We are invited to take a step back from our fraught lives and take a long-term view. We are asked to find time to see the bigger picture. How much of what we do is important, and how much of what we do is not only a waste of time, but a waste of life.

It would be a pity to get to the other side of Christmas only to realise that a host of fake Santa Clauses had distracted us from contemplating the real direction of our lives.

**The Advent Wreath** - Today we light the first of our Advent candles. The four candles represent the four weeks of Advent. Three candles are purple and one is rose. The purple candles symbolize the prayer, sacrifices, and good works undertaken at this time. The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday. The progressive lighting of the candles symbolizes the expectation and hope surrounding our Lord's first coming into the world and the anticipation of his second coming to judge the living and the dead. The light signifies Christ, the Light of the world.

**Saint Andrew the Apostle - November 30<sup>th</sup>** - As one of the twelve apostles, Andrew worked closely with Our Lord during his public life. He was present at the Last Supper, beheld the risen Lord, witnessed the Ascension and shared in the graces and gifts of the first Pentecost. The good deeds and preaching of St. Andrew became known in all parts of the world. According to tradition, a part of the remains of St. Andrew were taken to Scotland, and he was chosen as the Protector of the Scottish people. The Cross of St. Andrew also adorns the British flag where it was placed after the union of Scotland and England.



**Sacrament of Reconciliation - Part 4: Absolution** - Having examined our conscience and become aware of our sins, and become contrite and confessed them and been given a penance to do then we receive Absolution. This is the moment when we are freed from our sins and our reconciliation with God and the Church is effected. Absolution is to free us from sin, and restore the life of God's friendship and grace within us. The priest is the minister of the Sacrament, but it is God himself who forgives us and set us free and restores His life in us.

**Posada** - The Posada begins in the parish this Sunday. The Statue will be blessed at Mass and sent on its way. With it will be the list of names and telephone numbers of the people who have signed up. I have a copy in the Presbytery. There is a plastic wallet with the suggested prayers and the little book I showed last Sunday. **Hearing the message of Jesus** - At Clare Priory - Wednesday, 2nd December 9.30am to 3.30pm; *Repeated on ...* Thursday, 3rd December 9.30am to 3.30pm - This event has been planned to give us the opportunity to listen to the words of Jesus from within our hearts. This tradition of prayer flows out of the Hebrew method of studying the scriptures. It was part of the devotional practice of the Jews in the days of Jesus.
